Business sentiment for Q1 2020

The Food, Drink & Hospitality industry sentiment has always been slightly more positive than the average small business, and this has not changed during the COVID-19 pandemic.

The Yoco Small Business Pulse is created by ranking the sentiment across five key business factors. We ask business owners to rank their sentiment to each question on a scale of one to five, where one is the most negative and five is the most positive. Three is neutral or shows no change.

Food, Drink & Hospitality business owners are particularly worried about the state of the business environment and their current business performance. Most expect no change in staff levels and they remain fairly positive about their opportunity to grow their profits over the next 12 months.


In general, how do you feel your business is currently performing, compared to 12 months ago?

The Pulse score is composed of five questions that respondents are asked about their business environment. The cumulative score of these questions give us the overall Pulse score. When we breakdown the Pulse into these questions we see a dramatic decrease in sentiment across all five questions this quarter.




- In general, how do you feel your business is currently performing, compared to 12 months ago?

Every quarter we ask business owners to rate the general business environment in South Africa from one to five. This is usually the lowest scoring question in the Yoco Small Business Pulse, this quarter is no exception. Although, the degree to which the sentiment has dropped during the COVID-19 pandemic is worth taking note of as it shows the confidence in the SA economic recovery after COVID-19.

37% more of FDH businesses believe that the general busines environment will be worse in 12 months time.




Before COVID-19 Q4 2019



FDH Business Challenges

The number one challenge facing small business owners in the Food, Drink & Hospitality industry is the COVID-19 pandemic – 88% of businesses list it as one of their major challenges at the moment.

Challenges for each industry are slightly different. Businesses in Food, Drink & Hospitality are less concerned about fluctuations in currency and their customer base not growing. Those challenges are replaced by their worries around reduced tourism levels and government regulations and red tape.



Is your business still operating in the lockdown?


The impact of COVID-19 on small businesses in SA is massive. Looking at the lockdown period alone, almost nine in every ten FDH businesses have been forced to close down during the five-week lockdown.



How is COVID-19 impacting your business?


Yes, I am able to operate online

Lockdown has caused an average reduction of **84%** in transaction volume for the Food, Drink & Hospitality industry.





How will you manage your business during lockdown?

Business owners are trying their best to respond to the pandemic, but it's difficult to know what precautions to put in place when the business environment is so unpredictable.

It's especially difficult when you're in the FDH industry. 23% of business owners in this industry believe that there is nothing that they can do, except close their businesses for the foreseeable future.





More businesses in the Food, Drink & Hospitality industry are paralysed and feel like they don't know how to manage their customers during this time. The ones that aren't paralysed are more likely to **increase their online presence through marketing and social media channels.**

Will you continue to pay your employees during the lockdown period?


Another major concern for small business owners for the next 12 months, is how best to manage their employees. Fewer businesses in Food, Drink & Hospitality are able to pay their employees' full salaries during the pandemic compared to the average. They are also more likely to reduce employee salaries in order to cope and to retrench their staff.


